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### **Year 9 NAPLAN and the HSC Minimum Literacy and Numeracy Standard**

Recently the Minister for Education announced new HSC Minimum Literacy and Numeracy Standards for all students in NSW. These changes require that from 2020, Year 12 students, therefore students in Year 9, 2017 and beyond, must reach a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy for the award of the HSC credential.

The standard is set at a practical level, mapped against the Australian Core Skills Framework Level 3 - a nationally agreed standard of functional literacy and numeracy. Sample questions in reading and numeracy, and examples of writing prompts are available here <https://hsc literacy numeracy.nesa.nsw.edu.au/>.

From this year onwards our students may prequalify for this minimum standard by achieving Band 8 or above in their Year 9 NAPLAN reading, writing and numeracy tests. It is important to understand that the NSW Educational Standards Authority (NESA) does not expect that all students will achieve Band 8 or above in their Year 9 NAPLAN tests.

Those students that do not achieve this standard in Year 9 will have multiple opportunities to achieve the standard through online tests. These online tests will be available for students to sit, if required, at least twice a year in Years 10, 11 and 12. NESA does expect the vast majority of students to meet the HSC minimum standard by the time they complete Year 12.

Students that are able to demonstrate this standard in Year 9 will prequalify for this component of the HSC when they reach Year 12. Students will not be excluded from the HSC on the basis of their results in Year 9 NAPLAN or subsequent online tests.

It is important that we encourage all of our students to give their best effort in attempting this year's NAPLAN tests as it enables Year 9 to prequalify for the HSC and it allows us to identify the best forms of support to provide for our Year 7 and Year 9 students into the future. I ask for your support and encouragement for your child in working towards this important goal.

I will be providing our educational community with further information about this work in coming weeks.

## WHS Hospitality Café





## HSIE Excursion to Sydney

On the 8th, 9th and 10th of March, 32 HSIE students from Year 11 undertook an excursion to Sydney under the supervision of Mrs McGufficke, Mr Houlahan and Mrs Munro. The purpose of the excursion was to take part in a variety of education activities such as fieldwork on urban growth and decline, Twitter for a business case study, the Supreme Court of NSW, a seminar from the Federal police, the State and Mitchell Library, The Sydney Jewish Museum and the Nicholson Museum.

All educational activities undertaken during this excursion support and consolidate the learning that occurs in the classroom over the next 18 months. Despite the busy itinerary, Wauchope High students displayed exemplary behaviour and were great ambassadors for the school and themselves.

The Legal Studies students had an action packed two days on the excursion. Thursday necessitated an early start as the students started the day at the Supreme Court. Wayne Gleeson from the Institute of Law organised a number of activities which involved sitting in the murder trial of Ron Medich who has been charged with the murder of Michael McQuirk, who was shot dead by a “hitman” in front of his 10 year old son. Medich was not the shooter but it has been alleged that he hired the shooter. Although a long technical argument took place regarding instructions to be given to the Jury took precedence, the students did get to see the defendant who looked like a smartly dressed grandfather. It is hard to reconcile the offence with the defendant. This case is still ongoing.

Justice Bellow spoke to the students about what was happening in the case, both before and after, proceedings. Bellow spoke very eloquently to the students about this, and other famous cases including the Jamie Gao murder which he had adjudicated. Bellow rued the fact that he is better known for representing Wally Lewis before the NRL Judiciary then for prosecuting terrorists. Special thanks must go to Wayne Gleeson for looking after us in this court and for organising for Justice Bellow to talk to the students. Students also observed the civil case where Gordon Wood is suing the State for Malicious Prosecution for the wrongful conviction of murder for killing his then girlfriend, Caroline Byrne. The acid burner was placed to the belly of the chief witness from the original trial. This story has

been of prime interest to Sydney residents for many years. This case is also ongoing.

## HSIE Excursion to Sydney (continued)

On Friday the students visited the New South Wales Federal Police Headquarters. This was a real highlight. A fascinating presentation on Human Trafficking, and Terrorism in Australia was followed by an animated discussion on these topics. We live in dark times and these issues should be a concern to us all.

History students had to negotiate a crowded bus trip from Central to Sydney University. We arrived at the main entrance and students were amazed at the architecture and size of the University. We quickly made our way to the Nicholson Museum. Students were given a guided tour of the museum starting with the exhibition on *Death Magic*, looking at the beliefs of the ancient Egyptians. Students also stopped to look at exhibits from Athens, and Pompeii, including a lego model of the town. The tour ended with a look at the head of a 'bunyip'. Students also had the chance to handle objects from the museum's collection which included weapons from Sparta.

After more walking, more bus rides and more walking we arrived at the Sydney Jewish Museum. First students experienced a lecture on the rise of Nazism, followed by a talk from a Holocaust survivor on his story. His family managed to escape from Germany and spent time in the Shanghai Ghetto. In our last hour at the Museum our group was treated to a guided tour of the museum's new exhibition. Students looked at many artefacts which showed the treatment of the Jewish People in Germany under the Nazi regime.

On Friday, students headed to the State Library on Macquarie Street. Students had a tour of the library fortunately the architecture of the Mitchell Library did live up to expectations. We were fortunate enough to be shown the stacks of the library, an area normally reserved for employees only. Students received their library cards and were shown how to access the library's digital journal collection, a valuable tool for all in their HSC subjects.



WAUCHOPE HIGH SCHOOL  
Examination Rules, Procedures and Conduct

To successfully complete examinations at Wauchope High School, students need to be aware of these rules, procedures and conduct rules:

**Seniors may not leave in the first 60 minutes OR last 30 minutes of any Examination.**

You should **consult your own copy** of the exam timetable to ensure that you attend all exams at the appropriate time and place ;

- Students who **arrive late** must report to the teacher(s) on duty in the examination room as soon as possible. **No additional time** will normally be given. A **misadventure form** may be completed at the conclusion of the exam;
- If you are **absent** from school on the day of an exam you must **phone the Principal or Deputy Principal** on that day and provide appropriate documentation on your first day back to school;
- Be prepared to complete missed exams on your return to school;
- Students who **behave inappropriately** may have **marks deducted** and/or be placed on detention. Parents will be contacted;
- Exam booklets or A4 sheets will be supplied for senior exams, when required. **Blue and black pens** must be used. All necessary stationery must be in a **clear plastic sleeve**;
- **Students must provide their own calculator for courses that have this requirement**;
- Senior students are not required at school when they are not doing an exam;
- Senior students should assemble **15 minutes prior** to the advertised starting time of their exam;
- Senior students must complete an Attendance Slip prior to commencing each Examination;
- **Full school uniform must be worn**;  
**Students are responsible for checking that all sections of their exam answers are handed to the supervising teacher at the conclusion of the exam.**

**You Must:**

- Follow the day to day rules of the school;
- Remove all essential exam equipment from your bag outside the hall;
- **Turn off mobile phones and other electronic items and leave them in your bag**;
- Place bag at the back of the examination room or as instructed by supervisors;
- Follow the supervisors instructions at ALL times;
- Sit at the desk allocated to you;
- Behave in a polite and courteous manner during the exam;
- Make a serious attempt to answering all questions in the examination;
- Only use an approved calculator that is silent, battery or solar powered, has been switched off and had all storage facilities cleared before entry into the exam;
- Bring your materials in a clear plastic sleeve or in your hands.
- **At the conclusion of the exam place all loose sheets of writing paper together inside the exam paper.**  
**Your name must be written on all pages.**
- **All scrap paper or working sheets must have your name written on each page and placed inside your exam paper.**

No paper is to leave the exam room and no paper is to be thrown in the bin.

**You Must Not:**

Speak or communicate to any other person other than the supervisors after entry into the exam;

Eat in the exam room, unless you have a medical condition requiring food at frequent intervals, you may however bring a clear water bottle which contains water only;

Behave in a way likely to disturb the work of others or upset the conduct of the exam;

Take into the exam room any books, notes, dictionaries, electronic dictionaries or other equipment unless stated by your teacher.

**In 2020, your child will need to meet a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to qualify for a Higher School Certificate (HSC).**



## PRACTICAL LITERACY AND NUMERACY SKILLS



The minimum standard will ensure that your child is ready for further education and training, employment and life after school.

The standard is set at Level 3 of the Australian Core Skills Framework (ACSF), a nationally agreed standard of functional literacy and numeracy.

It means students can do things like:

Find the time and date of a music concert on an online ticket website

Calculate the quantity of paint required to paint a room

Estimate distance, travel time and costs for a transport route

Take notes from a lecture or training session

Create a personal weekly budget in a spreadsheet

Write a job application letter

Measure quantities to follow a recipe

Follow safety instructions in an equipment manual

Enter data in a computer-based management system

## MULTIPLE OPPORTUNITIES TO MEET THE STANDARD



Your child will show that they have met the standard by passing new online reading, writing and numeracy tests.

They will take the online tests at school. Your child can take the tests up to twice a year in:

- ✓ Year 10
- ✓ Year 11
- ✓ Year 12
- ✓ for up to five years after they start their first HSC course.

Students can take the tests from next year when they are in Year 10.

## YEAR 9 NAPLAN: A CHANCE TO PREQUALIFY FOR THE STANDARD

Your child can prequalify for the standard by achieving Band 8 or above in their Year 9 NAPLAN reading, writing and numeracy tests this year. This means that they won't have to take the online tests.

**It is important for you to know that not all students are expected to achieve Band 8 in their Year 9 NAPLAN tests this year.**

**Your child will not be stopped from getting the HSC on the basis of their Year 9 NAPLAN results.**



Your child's literacy and numeracy skills will continue to develop and it is expected that they will meet the standard either by the end of Year 10, Year 11 or Year 12.

Your child's school will provide support for them to meet the standard to get the HSC.
