Hastings Education Fund supports Wauchope students

They say it takes a village to raise a child and that rang true at the 2019 Hastings Education Fund (HEF) grants presentation where 29 young students will now have the opportunity to make their dreams come true thanks to our generous community. In its eighth year, HEF has granted more than \$476,700 in non-cash support to more than 219 secondary school leavers in the Hastings who need a helping hand to pursue further study.

The support comes by way of textbooks, financial assistance for living away from home to tools of the trade. Funding comes direct from the generous pockets of community and business donors who offer sponsorship packages between \$1000 and \$10,000.

The recipients were chosen after a rigorous interview process, narrowed down from a pool of 76 applicants. "It's an amazing contribution that this fund has made to help students achieve their goals," HEF patron Jim O'Brien said. "We encourage young school leavers in the Hastings to have dreams and set high goals for their future careers and life. "We encourage them to believe in themselves. And we demonstrate our belief in them by giving them support to achieve those goals and dreams."

The recipients of Hastings Education Fund grants for Wauchope High School are: Kirstan Bird, Molly Styles, Lani Swinnerton and Jayde Willingham.

The students expect to pursue further study in areas from law, science/mathematics and nursing.

For the first time in four years, Wauchope High found the correct level of enthusiasm to enter a 14s Cricket team in the Statewide Knockout competition. After a series of interesting bumbles, we finally got a game against Melville at Landrigan Park.

The girls got a bit nervous as the Melville team arrived, as it was apparent from the gear that they brought with them that quite a few of the girls were playing weekend cricket. This was vastly different to our one weekend player.

However, Captain Kate (our lone weekend player) led from the front, firstly winning the toss and electing to bat.

Kate and Justice-Lee opened the batting and started well until Justice-Lee and Laicy were bowled by successive deliveries, leaving us at 2 for 4. This brought Abbie to the crease and started a tremendous partnership of 65 runs. Abbie defended stoutly and allowed Kate to play the more aggressive role. Kate top scored with 41 runs (including 6 fours), Abbie 11 (all in singles) and then Tori played a great little cameo at the end of the innings to score 10 with one boundary. The wicket-takers were Kate (3/7 from 4 overs), McKenna (2/9 from 3 overs) Tori (1/10 from 3 overs), Abbie (1/15 from 3 overs), while Laicy (0/8 from six overs), Charlotte (0/10 from 4 overs), Jaycie (0/7 from 2 overs) and Justice-Lee (0/15 from 3 overs) all bowled well.

Melville managed to sneak home for a three wicket win, but not only did our girls have a deal of fun, they put up a really good fight against a far more experienced team. It was a pleasure to coach the girls, as their behaviour and sportsmanship were outstanding. Thanks to Matt for carting the kit to and from the ground.

WATER RESTRICTIONS NOW IN FORCE

RESIDENTIAL

What days can I water? If your house is an even number you can water on even dates (the 2nd, 4th, 6th etc.) and if your house is an odd number, you can water on odd dates (the 1st, 3rd, 5th etc). There is no residential outside water use on the 31st day of the month.

Handheld hoses, fitted with a water cut-off trigger or control nozzle can be used for up to a **total of 10 minutes before 9am OR after 4pm on the allotted day** for:

Watering gardens and lawns (including new turf); or

Cleaning out garbage bins on a grass or gravel area; or

Topping up of pools or spas; or

Washing car or boat on a grass or gravel area. Boat motor flushing is permitted for 5 minutes only on day of use.

The following activities are **BANNED** for water use:

Using fixed hoses, water sprinklers, micro-sprays and drip irrigation systems; and

Cleaning windows, walls, roofs and gutters; and

Cleaning driveways, paths and hardstand areas (unless for health and safety reasons only); and

Filling or topping up temporary inflatable or portable pools.

Watering cans and buckets filled with suitable grey water (i.e. shower or sink) or rainwater can be used at any time. Use of potable water in watering cans and buckets can be used during your allotted time only.

PUBLIC AREAS

Sporting fields: only recycled water can be used.

Community gardens: only recycled or rainwater can be used.

Fountains and garden ponds: handheld hose can be used for up to 10 minutes before 9am OR after 4pm.

COMMERCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL

Plant nurseries, bowling greens and market gardens: sprinkler systems can be used for a maximum of 1 hour before 9am.

Water can only be used for essential production or to continue core business activities e.g. high-pressure water cleaning businesses. Water-saving efficiencies are strongly encouraged.

All other businesses can use a handheld hose with cut-off trigger or control nozzle for up to 10 minutes before 9am OR after 4pm.

Dust suppression is permitted with recycled water only.

Year 11 & 12 students

- Generally in the senior school students use folders with loose leaf paper or A4 exercise books. If they use the exercise books they must have a separate one for each subject.
- Students studying Mathematics require a 240pg exercise/grid book, scientific calculator (Abacus SX-11 Matrix or Casio fx82 Au plus11 preferred) & a geometry set.
- Students undertaking the Trade Skills course require a 5m metric tape measure, 1m folding carpenter's ruler, solid sole work boots and 3 carpenter's pencils. Students are encouraged to source their own safety glasses and ear protection, however PPE (other than boots) will be provided to all students
- Drama students require 2 x A4 Art Diaries and 240pg A4 lined work book
- Music students require a 240pg A4 lined work book and A4 Plastic sleeve folder
