There has been extensive damage to this fragile ecosystem due to flooding and an ever-increasing feral deer population. Students investigated the importance and effectiveness of various management strategies of this unique ecosystem in preparation for their first assessment task. Dave, a volunteer with Friends of Kooloonbung, gave a guided tour and explained the valuable work being carried out by this community organisation. It was a very informative and enjoyable learning experience for everyone.

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AGRICULTURE INDUSTRY TOUR



In week 2 our senior Agriculture and Primary Industries students ventured out to Tamworth for our maiden Ag Tour. The weather forecast was definitely not in our favour as we left Wauchope in the rain on Wednesday morning and the forecast for the rest of the week was close to doomsday. Due to the Oxley being closed we had a small detour via Bellingen, Dorrigo and Armidale with a stop over at the NSW DPI Trout Hatchery. The students were given a tour of the outdoor growing ponds as well as the growing tanks which contained the fingerlings. We soon found out that they are aggressive feeders and if you stand to close you will get wet. Given the rainy weather it was not going to make much difference. After a quick macas stop over for lunch we headed off in the direction of Bendemeer for our next stop over at Yarragool Stn owned by Tom and Rachel Rummery. Due to the wet weather their road was washed out so we had to go the long way round, 15ks on a wet dirt road, in a bus with a trailer, what could go wrong. The students were enjoying themselves so much it was nearly dark by the time we got back on the road and headed to our accommodation in Tamworth.

Thursday was a picture of sunshine and yellow canola crops as we headed across the Liverpool Plains to Carol then onto Piallaway where we spent the morning at Booradul Angus Stud.The students enjoyed the presentation and hands on fat cattle assessment as well as an insight into sample Genome tracing of livestock. Back on the bus and we headed across to Breeza where we had our lunch stop before going to Pursehouse Farms at Breeza Station. This was a broard acre cropping enterprise consisting of cereal crops and cotton which is operated by the Pursehouse family. We all enjoyed our paddock tour as well as inspecting and climbing all over the latest hightech tractors, harvesters and cotton picking machines. Isn't that right Scotty!!!!

AGRICULTURE INDUSTRY TOUR

Caroona feedlot was next on the agenda. We had a guided tour of their facilities which is owned by JBS Holdings, one of the largest cattle beef processing enterprises in the world. They had just built a new state of the art feed mill with 4 steam flaking roller mills and weighing, mixing and feed loading facilities. Students were keen to ask questions including potential for career pathways in the Feedlot Industry. Mrs Thornton thoroughly enjoyed the feedlot tour especially when we stopped and opened the door to have a closer look at the cattle feeding, oh that beautiful aroma just filled the bus.

After another night of heavy rain saw our Narrabri trip cancelled and winged it we did, straight out to the Tamworth Livestock exchange to the cattle sale which was all under cover. The students enjoyed looking at the sale pens and watching the auctioneers at work. The students were encouraged not to wave their hands about unless they had sufficient funds to pay for their cattle. The rain continued to fall so we headed for the wool mill at Nundle where we crossed a few swollen causeways. After a quick bit of retail therapy and watching the carding and spinning of wool we dined at the Nundle showgrounds, water views included. We then had to backtrack to Farrer High School for the afternoon milking session where the students gathered, milked and fed the dairy cows. Whilst no one got kicked there was a fair bit of manure that needed removing with a fire hose.

To finish off another long day it was dinner at the Longyard before an early night as we had an early start in the morning. A big thankyou to all the students, Mrs Thornton and Mr Palmer for making it such enjoyable trip and hopefully next year we will see more sunshine. -Mr Starr
